INTERVIEW WITH DAN MONEY BY WAYNE OREILLY

Dan money has been with State Street for fifteen years and currently heads up the EMEA programme for operational resiliency. Operational resiliency is currently one of the hot industry topics, with UK regulators heavily focused on it. Dan helps influence the programme to meet the local needs of the UK and Ireland.

How do you feel the Canary Wharf Chaplaincy supports your business?

"The thing I really value about the chaplaincy is the independent pastoral care element that we get. There are a couple of things I would like to highlight. People often see chaplaincy and immediately think faith and normally Christianity, but what I see the chaplaincy team offering is a much more pastoral care element and one that is a truly independent. I also think that the multi-faith part of the team is important as well and I think from both an individual perspective in terms of their faith and bringing their faith into the workplace and how it works, but also in the understanding of other faiths and how other people would approach things important to them from a faith perspective. I think another thing people might not realise about the chaplaincy is your experience in dealing with those issues that people may have, be that faith, personal, home life or work situation, and actually your ability to point people to the right resources to be able to help them, and you have that experience to do that. I also value some of the regular activities you put on such as the services and the work and faith forums which help us look at those aspects of our identity we bring to work and how we apply them."

What challenges do you think the chaplaincy faces since the Pandemic?

"In terms of the challenges you are currently facing, I think they are mostly around the way we work in the Wharf and the nature of our business. For a lot of people, hybrid working has changed things. People are not in the office so much, but also when people are in the office their days are packed and I think it therefore limits the opportunity to meet with a chaplain face to face or attend particular services or forums. I also think another challenge the chaplaincy is facing is the rise in numbers of different companies working in the wharf on any given day. Alongside this is the rise in retail and residents on the estate. I think the Chaplaincy will have to look at what on-line tools you can use, and how you can make sure people realise you are there, and raise awareness that you are here for us when we need you."
